CURIOSITY ABOUT CHRISTMAS TIME: It's a period of celebration, reflection, and togetherness, encompassing Advent, Christmas Day, and the festive days following, called Yuletide or Christmastide. The Twelve Days of Christmas, lasts 12 days, from 25 December to 5 January, the latter date being named as Twelfth Night. These traditional dates are adhered to by the Lutheran Church and the Anglican Church. In the "usus antiquior" of the Roman rite, per the general rubrics of the Roman Breviary, "Christmastide" includes both "the season of Christmas" (the 12 days seen earlier) and "the season of Epiphany," which is the eight days from the Epiphany on Jan. 6 to the commemoration of the Baptism of the Lord on Jan. 13. What is now called the season of Epiphany was, until

1955, observed as the Octave of the Epiphany.

But here it is the surprise!!! Candlemas, or the feast of the Presentation of the Lord, is Feb. 2. On this day, many Catholics bring candles to the church to be blessed. They can then light these candles at home during prayer or difficult times as a symbol of Jesus Christ, the light of the world.

Candlemas is the last day that the Marian hymn "Alma Redemptoris Mater" is sung at the end of the night prayer of the Divine Office. The "Alma Redemptoris Mater" is used from the beginning of Advent through Feb. 2, and so Candlemas has come to be associated with the close of the Christmas season.

So what is the exact right time to observe the end of the Christmas season? That is largely a personal call based on your own traditions, customs, practical matters, and other factors. For safety reasons, I recommend that you take your tree down as soon as it starts shedding a lot of needles, but other than that, there's an argument for leaving things up as late as Feb. 2. Of course, your neighbours may disagree.




or Theophany, commemorates Jesus' baptism by John the Baptist in the Jordan River, signifying the start of His public ministry, His anointing as Messiah, and the manifestation of the Holy Trinity (Father, Son, and Holy Spirit). It's a moment of profound humility where sinless Jesus identifies with humanity, setting an example for Christians, and is celebrated as a distinct feast day, the Sunday after Epiphany.

At the Epiphany, (a word which literally means revelation or manifestation) Jesus' glory is revealed to the Magi. Traditionally, the church sees the Epiphany as being, by extension,

Jesus' manifestation to "the nations," or to all the other non-Jewish pagan cultures of the world who would not have previously known the one true God. In the narrative of Jesus' baptism, it is revealed that he is the beloved Son of God. The connection between these seemingly unconnected events in the life of Jesus is particularly clear: all these scriptural manifestations, even those that occurred decades apart, harken back to Bethlehem, because the birth of Christ was the first and most radical revelation, namely, the Incarnate Word of God.
